

International Experiential Learning Certificate (IELC) Requirements for Fall 2019 - Summer 2020

The Beedie School of Business is pleased to offer its undergraduate students an International Experiential Learning Certificate (IELC) to be earned through a combination of international experience, language acquisition, and the study of international business courses and courses contributing to a global perspective.

A. International Experience Component Students must complete one of the following streams:
Stream 1: Study Abroad One study abroad term (at least nine units) as an exchange student at an SFU exchange partner, or one full time SFU field school program or an alternate approved full time Study Abroad program.
Stream 2: International Co-op Complete one full time international Co-operative Education Term.
* Stream 2 students must also complete an additional 6 units from either the Languages, International Business or the Global Perspective courses, with at least one of these courses being upper division.
